3. Movements and their consequences

The presentations are group efforts to present the material. There will be handouts on each paper/presentation describing the criteria. Papers and presentations are due on the dates in the course outline. Late papers will be accepted within reason. Make-up tests and quizzes will be available. Presentations cannot be made up.
